ON YOUR GRADUATION.

I am certain that in the past three months, many of you have had defining moments, and as you graduate, I encourage you to keep pressing upwards, onwards, and toward the goal of the high call of God in Christ Jesus. You have chosen for your graduation the theme, "BEHOLDERS" and it is a wonderful prophetic proposition for this hour.

One of the great promises in scripture is that we will all one day see His face (Revelations 22:3-5). I don't know of anything I desire or long for more than this. This is my one consummate desire - to see His Face. A face-to-face encounter with Him is the longing of every saint of every generation, and His promise to us is that we shall see His Face. Whilst this is a future promise, the challenge is for us to appropriate this, right here and now. John tells us we shall see Him as He is (1 John 3:2). Isaiah says our eyes shall behold the King in His beauty (Isaiah 33). Jesus said if anyone loves Me, he will keep my commandments and he who loves Me, I will manifest Myself to him (John 14:21). It is the desire of the Lord to manifest Himself to us.



Paul tells us that "we all, with unveiled face, beholding as in a mirror the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, just as by the Spirit of the Lord" (2 Corinthians 3:18). If our faces are veiled, then we are unable to behold Him. Those are the key words: "unveiled face." How do you and I attain this posture of an unveiled face as we behold Him?

In the 8th chapter of Mark's gospel, a blind man is brought to Jesus to be healed in the city of Bethsaida. Now, Bethsaida was a privileged city because they saw many great miracles of Jesus, yet in spite of that, the people refused to believe in Him. So the Lord takes him out to the city limits, makes spit, puts it on the eyes of the blind man, laid His hands on the man's eyes, and asked him if he saw anything - the man answers and says: I see men like trees walking. In other words, his sight was restored to him, but only partially. The Lord put His hands the 2nd time on this blind man's eyes and this time, he was restored completely and saw with 20/20 vision. I have heard several different interpretations to this. Someone said Jesus' faith wasn't perfect; someone said the blind man's faith wasn't perfect and all that is baloney.

The blind man in the story is you and me. I am the blind man. You are the blind man. Before we got saved, we were blind, like the man. We were in darkness and we could not see. We were completely ignorant of the unseen realities around us. The Kingdom of God was 6 inches in front of your nose, and you couldn't see it. But the moment you believed, something happened. What happened? The veil that blinded your eyes was removed. Jesus put it this way. He said unless a man be born again, he cannot "see" the Kingdom of Heaven. The believing removes the veil, and immediately you are illumined. You start to see, you start to understand, and all of a sudden, we see things we have never seen things before. The spiritual world becomes a reality to us and our understanding is enlightened.

HE WANTS TO GIVE YOU THE ABILITY TO INTUIT THE FUTURE.

That's the nature of revelation. One moment you don't see; and the next moment, you can see. Revelation simply means to lift the veil. Five seconds before Jesus popped that question to Simon Peter, he had no idea who Jesus really was. As far as Peter was concerned, Jesus was a rabbi, a miracle worker, a prophet, and a good man. But suddenly the lights went on and he recognises Jesus for who He really is. I know who You are, "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God."

But for most of us, at best, when we get saved, we still see men as trees walking.

We have spiritual perception, but only partially.

One of the things that must precipitate in us is a cry for God to open our eyes a 2nd time.

Because God is seeking to give you 20/20 vision. He wants us to see with clarity of perception. What the Lord did to this blind man, He wants to do for each of us as well.

He wants to come to us a second time and

give us 20/20 vision. He wants to give you the ability to intuit the future. He wants to give you supersized lenses because God operates by optical precision. He wants to give you clarity of perception, and He wants you to behold Him.

Isaiah 25:7 "And He will destroy on this mountain the surface of the covering cast over all people and the veil that is spread over all nations."

What is a veil? Basically, it is an obstructed vision. It is a covering. The first thing you have to understand about veils is that there is a massive veil over the nations and it is the one thing that prevents people from believing the gospel. If you believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, it is because the veil that is over your face has been lifted. If the veil is still there, you will not see, neither will you understand. And this veil over the nations blinds the inhabitants of this world and prevents them from seeing the light of the gospel. They cannot see because they are blind and they are blind because the god of this world has blinded their eyes, and the way he does it is to put a veil over them.




Paul says in 2 Corinthians 4:3-4 "And even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are perishing. In their case, the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God." When a church begins to understand

how all these work; when we begin to understand spiritual realities, and rise to pray and intercede, understand that corporately, they can actually punch a hole in that surface covering, over our families, and over our communities. When the veil over our community is weakened or removed, what do we call that? It is an open heaven. Once the veil has been removed, there is no longer a hindrance, and the result is that you have an uninterrupted flow of revelation and life.

All of a sudden, people are awakened, and they begin to see. People will begin to turn to the Lord easily. What do we call that? Revival!

After 33 years in full time ministry, it is so much easier to operate under an open heaven than it is to operate under a closed heaven. I tell you this – there is a prophetic longing for the veil between heaven and earth to be torn. The cry of the prophet is "Oh that you would rend the heavens and come down..." (Isaiah 64:1).

The first mention of a veil in the OT was the veil that was placed over Moses' face. If you recall, when Moses descended from Mount Sinai, "the skin of his face shone because he had been in the Presence of Almighty God" (Exodus 34). When the people saw him, they were afraid. So, Moses veiled his face to keep the people from beholding the glory that was radiating from his countenance. And whenever Moses entered the tabernacle to speak with God, he would unveil his face. The whole picture of the veil over Moses' face was to conceal the light of God's glory from the people. And that's exactly what Paul was referring to in 2 Corinthians 3. This veil over Moses' face was a prophetic picture of the blindness that would come upon the Jewish people. Paul said in 2 Corinthians 3 that "till this day the same veil remains unlifted in the reading of the Old Testament, because the veil is taken away in Christ. But even to this day, when Moses is read, a veil lies on their heart..." When Jews read the OT, their eyes were veiled from seeing the truth and glory of Christ. And it is still there, thousands of years later. They can't see that Jesus is the Messiah inspite of all the evidence. Why is that so? Because there is a veil over the nation. And it is there for our sakes.



The 2nd mention of a veil was in the Tabernacle of Moses. Now God had promised to dwell among His people, but within the veil (Leviticus 16:2). The veil in the Tabernacle was to prevent people from entering into the Holy of Holies. The veil was, in essence, God's mercy, protecting a sin-tainted congregation from God's Holiness and judgments. But the veil did not just keep the people out, it also kept God boxed in. God's deep longing was for His people to come into His presence and behold His glory. He wants His Face to be seen. Ezekiel 39:29 says, "And I will not hide my face anymore from them, when I pour out my Spirit upon the house of Israel, declares the Lord God." When Jesus died on the Cross, what was God's first judicial act? He tore the veil in the temple from top to

bottom. Actually it was more than a veil. It was a carpet wall that was 9 inches thick. I mean, no human being could rip that veil apart. That ornate curtain was a wall of separation between the holy place and the most holy place which housed the Ark of the Covenant. That was the first thing God did and it tells us a lot about what He desired. He wanted His people to draw near to Him.

When David erected the Tabernacle on Zion's Hill, there was no veil in the Tent because David had a revelation of what God wanted. David knew what God desired because he was a man after God's own heart. So now, in the Tabernacle of David, the congregation of Israel could behold the Ark of His Presence and not die. This is mind boggling. This was what God always wanted, for His glory to be made manifest to His people. He doesn't want to hide behind a curtain any longer. And that's why God is going to raise up the Tabernacle of David, not the Tabernacle of Moses. Amos 9:13 "'On that day I will raise up the tabernacle of David, which has fallen down, and repair its damages; I will

raise up its ruins, and rebuild it as in the days of old..." What does that tell us? He wants His Glory to be seen by us. Now in the OT, the Ark was not visible to the people. Only the High Priest, once a year, on the Day of Atonement, could enter in and behold the Ark. That veil kept the people from beholding the glory.

Hebrews 10:19-25 "Therefore, brethren, having boldness to enter the Holiest by the blood of Jesus, by a new and living way which He consecrated for us, through the veil, that is, His flesh, and having a High Priest over the house of God, let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water."

Hebrews 10 deals primarily with the new and living way into the Holy of Holies. If I could summarise the goal of the Christian, it is to enter in and to live within the Veil. The sad thing is, many of us are iust content to settle for a relationship with God in the Outer Courts and some of us can't even make it to the Holy Place. But our destination is within the veil. It is there that we, with an unveiled face, behold His glory.





In the OT, a veil separated the people from the shekinah glory of God indicating that the way into the Holy of Holies was not open to the rest of Israel because the blood of bulls and goats were insufficient to take away our sins (Hebrews 10:4). There was no sacrifice in the OT great enough to remove our sins and to allow us to enter in. But when Jesus died on the cross, what was the first thing that happened the moment Jesus gave up His Spirit? The veil in the temple was rent from top to bottom. God waited for a long time to do that because He wanted to open up to us, a new and living way into His presence, and that ought to be our consuming desire. Jesus did not just die to save us from our sins. He died so that we could enter in.

Rees Howells talked about how the moment he surrendered all and entered through the veil. Evan Roberts talked about his experiences with God within the veil and it was so holy, he never recorded it. George Mueller talked about the day he died to the world. Charles Finney, Smith Wigglesworth, Kathryn Kuhlman all had the same experience. How do we enter through the veil? The moment Jesus gave up the Ghost, the veil of the temple was rent from

top to bottom and a new and living way was opened to us. But the question is, do we want to enter in? Are you willing to pay the price to live within the veil, to live in the unseen realm of the kingdom? I believe everything starts with a desire. The invitation is opened to all but you have to be co-crucified with Christ. This is how God rips the veil for you and brings us personally into the Holy of Holies. God is no respecter of persons. This experience is offered to all, but it is not automatic or guaranteed. There is a price we have to pay – the only way for us to enter in is for our flesh to be crucified with Christ. This is Romans 6. When we first got saved, we were immature, unstable, needy, and carnal. We stumble into sin, repent and the Lord is so gracious and He forgives us. This happens again and again and we often get discouraged because we can't seem to have victory over the flesh. And we can't, not on our own, that's why Jesus died. The Lord does not want to leave us in this unstable condition - one day up, down the next. He wants us to know that total victory over the sinful nature is possible and His grace is sufficient to enable us to have complete dominance over sin. So being crucified with Christ is something you cannot do on your own. It is an experience only God alone can bring you into. So what must we do on our part? We must be willing to go to the cross, just as Christ was willing and obedient. We must be wholehearted for God and come to a place of complete consecration. And the way He prepares us for this is He will put His finger on areas of our hearts and deal with us. What they are, only He knows and if God says, "Are you willing to give this or that up," then we must











respond obediently to Him because those little foxes are the things that keep us out. Each time He says to give up something, He will also give you the grace for it. Jesus did not put Himself on the cross; it was the Father who put Him there. Sometimes when God says, "Will you give this up," our response is Lord, I'm willing, but I don't know if I have the strength to do it." You might be in a similar situation right now. You might say, "Pastor, there are so many things I cannot give up." But if you are willing, then God can make you willing to be willing. And this has to be personalised for each of us. Each time we obey, part of the veil is removed. And we must experience for ourselves the crucifixion and death if we are going to live within the veil.

Whilst we will one day see Him face to face, in all His glory, do you want to see Him now, in the flesh? The Bible talks of a day when the final veil will be lifted and the Son of Man will be "revealed" and every eye will see Him (Luke 17:30). He will rend the veil between heaven and earth and every nation, even those who pierced Him, will see Him as He is. The scales will fall from these earth-bound eyes. Every eye will at last be unveiled to behold the King of Glory (Revelations 1:7). A very short time remains before the Lord begins to manifest His glory and we must begin to cry out, "O Lord, cleanse me that I might be a prepared vessel that is ready for Your glory."

Once again, congratulations on your graduation. May the favour of Him who dwelt in the burning bush be upon you always.

THE LANGUAGE OF BEHOLD IS ALWAYS COMMITMENT, DEVOTION AND SURRENDER.



Congratulations, Batch 16, on your graduation. Over the past 12 weeks, I have been privileged to see, close up, each of you being conformed more into the image of our Christ as brave Beholders.

2 Corinthians 3:17-18 says, "Now the Lord is the Spirit and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. And we all, with unveiled face, beholding the glory of God, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another. For this comes from God who is the Spirit."

How are we transformed into the image of Christ? **By BEHOLDING the Glory of God.**

Beholding is a fixed gaze, it is a leaning in, and it is a consecrated line of sight unto God. Who causes us to behold? The Spirit. And where do we behold this glory? It's in the scriptures, in the secret place, in face-to-face admonishment of and acknowledgement our Saviour. We behold the glory of God by allowing the Spirit to speak to us through the Logos and Rhema word, bringing God's truth, to the depths of our heart with fresh power and urgency.

Does this '**BEHOLDING**' just happen? In one way, yes, for it's a gift of grace. However, beholding God's glory involves a purposeful proactive posture and purposeful effort.



Batch 16 Beholders, my heart for you is that 'the remedy would be the retina.' That this journey of **BEHOLDING** would continue and that the eyes of your heart be opened, beyond your imagination for decades to come.

Psalm 16 says, "I have set the Lord always before me, I will keep my eyes always on the Lord." The language of beholding is always commitment, devotion, and surrender. My prayer for you as you spread your wings unto the next chapter is rooted in 2 Kings 6:8-17. In this passage, the servant of the man sees a vast enemy army surrounding him.

He responds frantically to Elisha, "O My Lord, what shall we do?" Elisha responds with 'What do you see?'

This seems like a ridiculous question in view of his previous comment. If it was me, I might mutter sparingly under my breath, "I just told you what I saw!"

But Elisha was **BEHOLDING** – He was seeing a different perspective, he goes on to tell the servant "Open your eyes" – and as he does... "Do not be afraid, for those who are with us are more than those who are against us" – and the servant's eyes were opened. He now sees chariots of fire surrounding the enemy territory, far more in number than the enemy tactics.

WE BECOME WHAT WE BEHOLD. THE MORE CLEARLY WE SEE HIM, THE MORE WE WILL BECOME LIKE HIM.

Elisha was teaching the servant the art of **BEHOLDING**– to stop seeing in one dimensional. Living in a one dimensional perspective means our viewfinder is compromised by feelings, emotions, conflicts. In the one dimensional we are seeing through a lens of fear and self. But **BEHOLDING** takes us to seeing in three dimensions – through the lens of the Father, Son, and Spirit. A whole new vantage point is opened. We see through the lens of the Spirit.

BEHOLDING holds a posture of *insight* over hindsight or foresight. It recognises and responds to our 'now address' – in Christ, creating capacity for insight *in this moment*. We become what we behold. The more clearly we see Him, the more we will become like Him.



OUR SPIRITUAL

"Where there is no vision, the people perish; but he that keepeth the law, happy is he. Prove (6s 29:18

> How important it is for us to remember that what keeps us alive is having a vision - not only a vision but to see what God sees in the way He looks at the world. Having vision brings clarity of the purpose that God has for us, it allows us to walk the path He wants for us, and to fulfil the works that are designed for us. "Then the Lord said to me, 'You have seen well, for I am watching over my word to perform it."" Jeremiah 1:12. Do we know that God is also watching over His Word that He has decreed? And why does the Lord watch over His Word? This is because He is ready to fulfil what is written. However, we need to come to the place of realisation like Jeremiah did, to see what God wants to do so that we can partner with Him to work out the plans He has.

ARE WE WILLING TO ALLOW THE LORD TO RESTORE OUR SPIRITUAL EYES TO SEE THINGS THE WAY HE DOES?

Unfortunately, the people of Israel didn't see what God was warning them about it through His prophet, and they were led into exile and sent away to a foreign land. How did this happen? They lost the vision of who God was, and their role as a nation to be the light of the world. In fact, I would liken them to be suffering from a physical condition called spiritual Glaucoma. Glaucoma is an eye condition that reduces a person's field of view due to the death of the nerve cells on the retina which results in the person having pin-hole vision. Coincidentally, Glaucoma is also known as the silent thief of sight because most people will not realise their loss of vision until they go for a vision screening.

As John 10:10 says, "The thief does not come except to steal, to kill, and to destroy. I have come that they may have life, and that they may have it more abundantly." Instead of looking to Christ, the Son of the Living God, our enemy, the thief seeks to steal our spiritual vision by distracting us to look at the world and all that it offers. This weakens our spiritual vitality and dispossesses us of the godly strength to walk in His perfect will.

When a person suffers from Glaucoma, the physical eyes turn bad because of the high eye pressure. Similarly, our spiritual eyes, they turn bad because of the high life pressure we face, thereby causing us to lose sight of God.





In the Bible, we see a man used mightily by the Lord to lead the children of Israel out of Egypt, and to deliver them from the oppression of their enemies. That man is Moses, and the Scripture records that Moses was a man who lived a full life, fulfilled the call of God upon his life, and most importantly, never lost sight of who God was - "Moses was 120 years old when he died. His eye was undimmed, and his vigor unabated," Deuteronomy 34:7. His eyes were undimmed says Scripture, despite all that he experienced in the wilderness with the children of Israel, and for all the challenges He faced. What was the secret of his 20/20 vision? He kept his eyes on God. Throughout his life, Moses was faithful to perform what God required of him. In the natural, we need the sun to achieve perfect vision, and in the spiritual sense, we need to look at the Son of God for a perfect spiritual vision.

The truth is, God is still looking for His Word to be performed in today's day and age, and He wants to do it through individuals who will depend and rely on Him. The age old question remains – "are we willing to allow the Lord to restore our spiritual eyes to see things the way He does, and are we willing to stay close to the Son so that we will fix our spiritual eyes on Him?" It is only with a pair of restored spiritual eyes that we can see what God wants to do, and become effective servants of the Lord in our generation, just like Jeremiah, Moses, and many other men & women of God were in theirs.



Mention the book of Romans and most people would acknowledge it for being the most systematic presentation of Christian doctrine written in the Bible. Many more would expound on its clarity with regard to salvation through Christ and how it supported the key theological belief of Sola Fide (by faith alone). This letter to the Romans was also one of the main texts for Martin Luther's Ninety-five Theses that affected what we now know as the Protestant movement of which we partake in. All these would sound rather exciting if you're a theologian or biblical scholar. But how do the rest of us ordinary folks make sense of this epistle?

Well, did you know that Romans was written around AD58? Or that the apostle Paul who wrote the letter was on his way to Spain but had to detour to Jerusalem and therefore was intending to bypass Rome after? Or the fact that Priscilla and Aquila were mentioned indicated that the Jews were once again back in Rome after being kicked out by Emperor Claudius in AD48? If you didn't,

neither did we initially. But these facts and the many more historical nuggets taught over the duration of the class, made the book of Romans so much more engaging to study. With history and context overlaid onto an expository line by line teaching of the entire sixteen chapters of Romans, it made learning so much more palatable and deepened the understanding of the text. Understanding the context enhanced our spiritual understanding of the book of Romans. The overarching theme of salvation was brought out more clearly as well. Where most pulpit teachings would usually place emphasis on the theological underpinnings such as justification by faith or focus on Israel's rejection and salvation in Christ; through the lessons in Romans, one would come to realise that the three beginning chapters of the epistle were the keys to understanding the entire book. They established the fundamental issue - man's problem with sin, and the identified categories of sinners; paving the way for one to understand salvation in its fullness.

Two key takeaways from the Romans class were the emphasis on our relationship with God and our total surrender to Him. As individuals and leaders in ministry, our relationship with God must not be neglected. Emphasis on the grace of the Spirit, not the works of the law, being the enablement of what would carry us through to the end of our faith journey was clearly evident in the book of Romans. As such the importance of the baptism of the Holy Spirit for



every believer could not be more heavily stressed in order that all attain to the relationship that the Father would so desire in us. To those entrusted to us, our responsibility would be to ensure they enjoy a deep and intentional communion with the Lord. We ourselves must model this relationship and exemplify the deep connection and guided obedience to the Spirit in our own lives. We must also challenge ourselves and those with us to continually surrender every part of our lives to the Lord. Understanding the book of Romans makes more evident the truth of Galatians 2:20a that "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me." Without a wholehearted surrender of our lives to God, He cannot fully work in us. The wisdom and grace of God would be much needed to live this out. One of the biggest challenges today would be the lure of modern life. A common issue encountered by the church today is that believers do not wish to progress to discipleship with God but choose to be content to continue to live life at the basic level of salvation. Unable to sacrifice the pleasures of the world, many have stayed at the place of the initial salvation and allowed the blessings of God to hold us back from a greater destiny in Christ.

As the lecturer puts it, the church today needs another move of the Spirit. Only a move of the Spirit would be able to propel us out of our comfort zones and into the things of the kingdom. In Romans 10:18, the early church had conquered the then known world in a relatively short time because of the power of the Holy Spirit in them. The Spirit poured out powerfully into a fully surrendered life causes an activation to accomplish the will of God. Our prayer must be like John the Baptist to say, "He must increase, but I must decrease." May the Lord once again invade our nations with a mighty move of the Spirit that the church may be in revival so that Christ be known to all the world.

BEHOLDERS OF Shekinah Glory



Admittedly, I had very little knowledge of intercession before coming to the BCW. I was challenged when Grubb spoke about believers regarding intercession as some form of rather "intensified prayer." His expounding of the principles of intercession gave me a greater understanding of what intercession is and what Mr. Howells often meant by "gaining the position." What impacted me most in this chapter is the way Grubb reveals Jesus as the Ultimate Intercessor, as He "ever lives to make intercession for us" (Hebrews 7:25). Intercession is not just something inspiring that we may glean from Mr. Howell"s life, but is seen in Jesus, whom we are called to think and act like (Philippians 2:5). Grubb states that the Holy Spirit can only work in the hearts and bodies of those who are His dwelling place and whose natural life have been dealt with. Since being at the BCW, the Lord has been showing me the importance of being His vessel, fully surrendered and dead to my flesh. This is what we see throughout Mr. Howells life, as the Holy Spirit cleansed and sanctified him, so he became holy, useful to the Master and ready for every good work (2 Timothy 2:21).

OUR JEWISH ROOTS by Joshua Tan

As I am writing this, it is mid-October 2023 and over a week has now passed since Palestinian terror group Hamas infiltrated Israeli soil and brutally massacred over 1200 kibbutzim residents. This has pushed Israel on its resolute and retaliatory warpath to wipe Hamas out, notwithstanding the human and collateral damage. Shocked by the brutality of the Hamas massacres, numerous nations worldwide have come out in support of Israel – most in speech, some in action. Conversely, surrounding Arab nations have shored up military instruments furtively along their borders with Israel, apprehensive of their military fragility and the watching global community.





However, history tells us that the Jewish people have faced disproportionately more revilement than affection through their 4000 years – so any international endorsement they receive now is but tenuous – a shift in global opinion could easily greenlight an Arab onslaught and widen the war beyond the Middle East.

Yet despite all this carnage, destruction and despair, God's heart remains unwilling that any should perish but that all come to repentance (2 Peter 3:9). His grand plan – to gather together in one all things under Christ (Ephesians 1:10) be it the Jews, Palestinians, Arabs, all of us – started with the advent of the Jewish race and will culminate when He and His children, Jew or Gentile alike, finally establish His Kingdom on this Earth.





We are now at the cusp of end-time prophecies being fulfilled, and it becomes increasingly urgent that we heed the Bible's call to circumcise our hearts and assume our stations as intercessory watchmen in these last days.



As watchmen of the Lord (Isaiah 62:6-7), we should never keep silent, continually reminding Him while taking no rest for ourselves (sic). Our intercession for the endtime Harvest is to pray for His Will over Israel and the world to transpire – for the salvation of both Jew (Romans 10:1) and Gentile, whether friend or foe (Ezekiel 28:24-26).

As watchmen, let us:

BE ALERT, DISCERNING THE TIMES AND THE SEASONS

If we develop an intimate intercessory relationship with the Lord (Amos 3:7), He will grant us insight into these times and seasons, and confer wisdom and knowledge for our discernment (Daniel 2:21).

UNDERGIRD OUR HEARTS WITH AGAPE LOVE FOR ALL MANKIND

Let all that you do be done with love (1 Corinthians 16:14) and our prayers will be aligned with His Heart for all peoples.

FAITHFUL INTERCESSION FOR HIS KINGDOM AND WILL TO TRANSPIRE

We intercede not based on our emotions or intellect, but by the Spirit's counsel (Romans 8:26-27). Oftentimes, this may mean praying in the spirit and allowing His utterances to flow through us.

HE IS ABSOLUTELY AND IMMACULATELY GOOD AND THAT HE WILL WORK THINGS ACCORDING TO HIS PERFECT WILL.

Finally, let us recognise Israel's prominent role in the Lord's grand plan of redeeming all creation (Romans 11:24) - it is after all through Israel that all nations of the earth shall be blessed (Genesis 22:18). We as gentiles are grafts into His Kingdom through her, and as the grafted vines, we therefore share a common heritage with Israel. Being her brothers and sisters in Christ, let us love Israel as we would our kinsmen - not just in word but in convicted persuasion - and fervently pray that her eyes and heart will be open to Yeshua Hamashiach, to finally acknowledge their (and our) Messiah and be united once again with God. When Israel is saved, the redemption of all mankind will then be completed.

Returning to the current conflict in the Middle East, Joseph (vizier of the then-mighty Egypt) gives powerful insight into handling this tragedy – what the enemy meant for evil, God meant it for good... in order to save many people alive (Genesis 50:20). "That the most excellent method he had found of going to God, was that of doing our common business without any view of pleasing men, and (as far as we are capable) purely for the love of God.

> That it was a great delusion to think that the times of prayer ought to differ from the other times; that we are strictly obliged to adhere to God by action in the time of action, as by prayer in the season of prayer."

This quote from the fourth conversation addresses a common misconception of Christianity, that we only behave 'holy' in the presence of God, like in a prayer meeting or church service. However, we lack the understanding or consciousness of the omniscience of God, that He is everywhere, all the time.

In other words, there need not be a set time or methodology with regard to 'meeting' God. But rather it should be our daily agenda to do what is pleasing to God. Our acts of worship toward God need not just be manifest through our lips or physical posture but ultimately should be the posture of our spirit man; the position of our heart and the girding of the loins of the mind (1 Peter 1:13).

You need neither art nor science to go to God, but only a determined heart." This is a reality that we apparently "know" but do not "understand." The quote that inspires me is "A little remembrance of God, one act of inner worship, even though it is during a march with a sword in hand, is sufficient. Such prayers, however brief, are very acceptable to God." God never asked us for much. He never said we needed to prepare three songs to sing to Him or an essay to pray to Him. This book has shown me that abiding in the presence of God must be something we practise over time, as Holy Spirit works in us, sanctifying and growing us from strength to strength. Brother Lawrence said that for the first years, he employed himself during the time set apart for devotion with the thoughts of death, judgement, heaven, and his sins. He continued some years after that, applying his mind carefully the rest of the day and in the midst of business to the presence of God. He says this "practice" produced in him so high an esteem for God that faith alone was able to satisfy him. The use of this word "practice" shows that this is not something we instantly achieve once we are saved. Practice is defined as "the actual application or use of an idea, belief, or method, as opposed to theories relating to it." I feel that this is a very accurate explanation of how Brother Lawrence lived. He used and applied his beliefs in such a practical way, as opposed to just intellectually 'knowing' and not applying the theories. Often in Christian circles, we fall into the comparison trap or want an 'instant fix.' We compare our walk to fellow believers or think if we do not instantly desire God in all His fullness, we have done something wrong or we are not fully saved. However, it is so important to remember that it is a process, as this book has challenged me to view this with new eyes. 2 Corinthians 3:18 tells us that "the Lord – who is the Spirit – makes us more and more like Him as we are changed into His glorious image." In his conversations and letters, Brother Lawrence emphasized so much on exercising our attention and focusing on God, but one of the things that shifted my perspective came from his eighth letter which says, "If your mind wanders at times, don't be upset, because being upset will only distract you more. Allow your will to recall your attention gently to God. Such perseverance will please Him." When I read this, I could really imagine God speaking these words to me face-to-face and I agree; this is indeed God's loving voice. I have heard and read several exhortations about our need to stay and dwell in the presence of God and in my several attempts to put it into practice, every time I did not make it or when I failed and got distracted, I felt guilty. When he said that being upset will only distract you more, I have indeed experienced that, and even worse, I had thoughts that trying again would not be a good idea. So instead of pressing in and receiving the grace of God to abide in Him, I would stop trying and think of settling until another stirring from God comes. But here, that along with complete surrender and with a crucified life in Christ, I can be gentle with myself and instead of thinking of abiding as a hard task, I can see it as a learning and enjoyable fellowship with God. So I realised that being too hard on myself when I fail is something I can change. There might be distractions but what I really need to beware of is neglecting Him and His presence, which He has graciously made available for me.

Another game-changer for me is in his thirteenth letter, when he exhorted, "Let us look to God with these eyes of faith." Normally, I face a certain situation and contextualise it in relation to faith. And I have never really thought of looking at God with eyes of faith. In my understanding, this meant having the confidence or assurance that God is present with us every single time even if our physical or outward circumstances say otherwise. Therefore, I have no excuse or reason not to dwell in His presence.



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
